### Tradition = Success

With the overwhelmingly successful season that the Raiders have just come off of and the anticipation of the 1998-99 season, I sit and ponder, what has made the Raiders such a power for so long in the high school wrestling world? How can the Raider's success be measured? What has been the key to this success?

Often I hear that the fans are spoiled with the team's success. If the Raiders lose more than 2 or 3 matches or have no one place at the state tournament, it is sometimes a bit of a downer. However, other teams measure their success on how they do against the Raiders. The fact is that the fans (many from the very beginning) have been there to support the Raiders through their 38 seasons. I myself have been to many welcome home parties, with each being a lifting moment in its own way.

The fans and their given support through the years has been more than great. At times they are quiet and seem to sit and take in the match. But, when the Raiders take the mat for a big match, the fans are on their feet filling the air with such electricity! There have been years that not even a college gym could hold them all. When the match was over, the fans were soaked from sweating and hoarse from yelling. They worked as hard as the team themselves. Support is a key element in the success of anything... from a sports team or Fortune 500 company to a lasting marriage.

There are many adjectives that come to mind when I think of the success of the Raider team. Attitudes, dedication, hard work, and competition among themselves are just a few that come to mind. If you have ever had the chance to sit in or be a part of the Raider mat men practice room, you would see all of these good qualities at work. Young men with good attitudes that are dedicated to improve each time out and a lot of good old fashion hard work is what I have witnessed in the practice room. Pushing each other to the max would be another key to the continued success of the Raiders.

Then I think about the past in terms of where the program got its start...the tradition side of the success. During the 1970's, the years that I was a part of the wrestling, there were on average 95 wrestlers bidding for thirteen varsity or thirteen junior varsity spots. The practice room was the fiercest place in wrestling for any wrestler to be in. The middleweights could and often had fourteen or more contestants. The elimination bouts would be harder than well over half the opponents from other teams. It would be a hard fought two to three days to get the top guy to represent the Raider team in each weight class. The room at times was filled with teachers, parents, students and fans~all who had a favorite to cheer on. It wasn't very often that a freshman could fight his way into the varsity line up. This competition among each other led to strong unity and a great deal of handed down traditional pride. The younger program to this day is aware of this tradition and has great pride that pushes them to be as good as the group they grew up watching.

Then there is the coaching. From the inaugural season with Dick Sherwood up to the phenomenal past season with Brian Hills, the coaches have shown these teams a great deal of technique and character, along with wrestling knowledge. Any of the past head coaches would be quick to say that you need the combination of dedicated wrestlers and coaches that have a good working relationship. The respect of the coaches and past wrestlers has been evident through the years. The coaches have always welcomed help in the practice room. At times I have witnessed a half dozen-state qualifiers from the past suited up and sweating it out. The coaches have recognized what it takes to elevate the team to the next level. They teach aggressiveness by putting the younger kids in the toughest matches they can at a very early stage. Then they help them learn to lose as well as to win. They have done a terrific job all the way down to the first year kids in the elementary program. These coaches are very dedicated to the wrestlers, fans and each other.

These are a few of the key elements that I have identified to be the building blocks of a program that keeps producing the winningest (89.5%) team in the state of Pennsylvania. I've had the opportunity to see the elementary wrestling program, and I would have to say the tradition of winning will extend well into the next millennium!

## 1998-1999 SEASON - COLUMN #3 by Don Shaffer

Welcome again to the Reynolds Wrestling web site, your best and fastest coverage of the Raider 1998-99 season. The Raiders are coming into the heart of the season. The month of December was a great month for the Raiders. They started the season where they left off last year. They went into the Mountaineer Tournament, in Philipsburg-Osceola, and crowned 5 champs and out distanced the field of 8 as they won the team championship. The Raiders followed with a win over Jamestown and then crowned 7 champs, with 13-place finishers and the team championship at the Lewistown Tournament. They opened the Mercer County Conference with a win over Hickory. They ended the month with a great showing at the powerful Manheim Holiday Tournament. The Raiders finished the tournament in 4<sup>th</sup> place behind 3 nationally ranked teams. They crowned one champ, Steve Popovich, as 6 other Raiders placed.

Steve Popovich is sporting an undefeated record, at 11-0, while Josh Cilas, (a fill in) is also unbeaten at 2-0. Raider Freshman Justin Hollobaugh has been a nice surprise at 9-1 with two Tournament titles and a second place at Manheim. Justin Nestor, a sophomore took his first loss of the season at the Manheim Tournament. His record is currently 12-1. Jason Nestor and Doug Woods also lost their first bouts at the Manheim Tournament and have records of 10-2 and 11-2. Rocky Habel saw his first action of the year after sitting out of the Mountaineer Tournament and sports a record of 6-2. 10<sup>th</sup> grader Jerry Kendall has been a nice addition at 103# with a record of 10-4, and 3 place finishes in the 3 tournaments. The rest of the Raider matmen have gained a lot of experience during the month and will look to build from that.

While the Raiders have enjoyed the early success during the month of December they still have not reached their full potential. They have seen some good things from many different wrestlers, but know that they must continue to improve with each day. The month of January will provide the Raiders with stronger challenges each time they take to the mats. The Raiders open the first week with very little rest. They start with 2 Mercer County Conference matches. On January 5<sup>th</sup> they have their first home match with Grove City then travel to Hadley to tangle with Commodore Perry on the 7<sup>th</sup>. With no rest at all they then jump into the Tool City Tournament in Meadville on the 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup>. The following week and a half are 3 M.C.A.C. matches with Sharpville (Jan. 12<sup>th</sup> H.), Mercer (Jan. 14<sup>th</sup> A.), and Greenville (Jan. 21<sup>st</sup> A.). This should get them ready for the war that will take place in Brookville on the 23<sup>rd</sup>. The Raiders will be one of the top six ranked AA schools that will compete at the Duals in Brookville. The Raiders will square off with Wyalusing (currently ranked #1) and then mix it up with Canton (currently ranked #5). They finish the month with a M.C.A.C. match with Sharon, January 26<sup>th</sup> and then host the rescheduled match with Erie Prep. on the 28<sup>th</sup>. This leaves only a finishing home match with Kennedy Christian on February 2<sup>nd</sup>.

All of the remaining matches and tournaments give the fans a lot to cheer about. The Raiders will look to capture another M.C.A.C. crown and would have to be a favorite to win the Tool City Tournament. The Greenville match will provide the usual excitement. Wrestling fans will also get a chance to see a couple girls wrestle on the varsity level. Erin Tomeo of Grove City and Micah Kelly of Mercer will challenge to beat the Raiders. However wrestling fans, the place to be on January 23<sup>rd</sup> will be east on I-80 in the small town of Brookville, PA. I will write a special article prior to this event. The Ramblers of Erie Prep. is always a good match for the Raiders as well. So fans get ready for an exciting month of wrestling. I look forward to seeing many of you at the matches. ### Battle On the Interstate; Northwest takes on Northeast

January 23<sup>rd</sup>, 1999

Canton, who upset Wyalusing a year ago, has some very strong individuals as does Northern Lehigh, all of whom come out of District 4 and are located in the Williamsport area.

The fans will be downed in their school colors and strutting their stuff. For the most part there is no seating by section or team. Most will attempt to stay close to the ones they know.
